RE: Judicial Inquiry – P.C. Party Trust

Whereas you served as a Trustee of the P.C. Party when it first went into hiatus, you are familiar with the P.C. Party Trust.

It is the duty of the Minister of Justice to uphold the Laws of Canada and the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

The P.C. Party of Saskatchewan has taken the Trustees of the P.C. Party Trust to court for breach of trust. The P.C. Party has also added the Saskatchewan Party as a co-conspirator to the breach of trust.

This issue goes beyond the the civil dispute with the Trustees and the governing party. We have recently held a General Election where the citizen's charter rights to vote for candidates of the P.C. Party were restricted by the actions of the P.C. Party Trustees.

This issue arose in the Province of Manitoba in the 1990's. In that case, Justice Minister Vic Toews called a Judicial Inquiry at which Premier Gary Filmon testified. The issue in Manitoba was similar as their money was spent for more candidates to split the vote. In Saskatchewan, we had a worse situation of the withholding of money so as not to give a choice and not split the conservative vote.

We are asking you to do your duty and call a Judicial Inquiry into the Saskatchewan Party's involvement in the P.C. Party Trust. In a democracy, the ruling party should not interfere in an opposition party's finances. In Canada, it is a serious matter to interfere with a Trust.

Despite denials, there are troubling facts which Brad Wall and the Saskatchewan Party should answer. A majority of the Trustees had Saskatchewan Party connections. The Saskatchewan Party and the Trustees had the same lawyer when the Trust cut off funding to the P.C. Party.

It is also relevant that Premier Wall announced the resignation of the President of the Trust on Nov. 9<sup>th</sup>, 2007 when the P.C. Party was not notified of the resignation until Jan. 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2009 at an examination for discovery. The President of the Trust is on tape at the first caucus meeting of the Wall government.

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The Saskatchewan Party's interference with P.C. Party finances is ongoing. Prior to the recent election, the P.C. Party located a \$10,000 dollar constituency account in Davidson - a sum sufficient to run a candidate. The signing officers finally agreed to sign over the account. They delayed the surrender of the account and it has not yet been received. The P.C. Party has now learned one of the signing officers acted as the business agent for the Saskatchewan Party candidate.

Whereas you and all of the caucus are potential witnesses in future court proceedings, we suggest that you refer this request to the Manitoba Justice department for a decision.
